In recognition of his service, we have chosen to permanently display the sculpture known as Homeless Jesus (which has been donated by an anonymous benefactor) at St. Vincent de Paul Parish. In addition to conveying my warmest thanks on behalf of the Urban Vicariate of the Archdiocese of Baltimore to Father Dick for his many years of dedicated ministry here in the City of Baltimore, I'd like to take a moment to note his selfless decision to retire due to his recent declining health. It is not surprising to anyone who knows Father Dick that he put the needs of the parish and the Church ahead of his own great love and desire to continue leading St. Vincent's.

This selflessness has characterized his priestly ministry these 4-plus decades that he has led St. Vincent's and is matched only by his sincere care for the least among us, as evidenced by the parish's ministry to the homeless of Baltimore City.
